**Featured Projects** 

This month, the following cities have volunteered to share a featured project. We hope these examples provide your city with some helpful information on implementing its own initiatives.

## City of Lubbock

On August 27 and 28, 2019, Lubbock City Council conducted a two-day Special Meeting for participation in the Lubbock Downtown Master Plan Update Workshop. Presented by Overland Partners, Day 1 examined desired outcomes of the Master Plan Update; relevance of previous work relating to Downtown; and a "Mark the Map" exercise of current and forthcoming projects.

Day 2 involved setting design parameters including new programs and catalysts for strengthening Downtown; a model session focusing on utilities, parks, traffic, parking and historic buildings and places; and a team sketch session.

In addition, City Council passed on first reading a Short Term Rental (STR) Ordinance which requires that STR's are properly registered along with payment of hotel occupancy taxes. This item is scheduled for second reading on September 10, 2019. For more information, contact:

## City of Abilene


The Abilene Planning and Development Services Department is working on a Vacant Commercial and Residential Building registration program for their Neighborhood Empowerment Zone (NEZ). The goals of the program are to require registration of all vacant structures, submission of a maintenance plan, and an annual registration fee. The Department is recommending the creation of a Vacant Building Advisory Task Force involving multiple stakeholders to conduct a study of vacant buildings. ## City of San Angelo

On August 20, 2019, San Angelo City Council approved changes to the Land Development and Subdivision Ordinance (LDSO) recommended by the Planning Division. The amendments were originally discussed at the City's Development Task Force and later brought forward to the Planning Commission to obtain community input. These changes include when a plat gets recorded and expires; types of performance guarantees and deferral options; and an overall cleanup of language. The following changes were approved by Council:

- Exemption from platting of up to three lots under common ownership for single or two-family homes;
- Exemption from platting for construction under a certain floor area (i.e. up to 25% of current floor area to maximum of 5,000 square feet annually for non single-family residential;
- Expiry of preliminary plats after five years unless approved final plat or with progress options being completed
- Establishing a Deferral of Obligation option to defer improvements until after plat recordation up to time of permitting;
- Changes to the drainage section of the ordinance, including a deferral option to a later stage of development
- Clarified that the act of subdividing property is what triggers the requirement to plat, not the need for a building permit
